- Student versions of Child Safety policies.
- Student created Child Safety posters.
- Regular Child Safety communications in newsletters, staff and parent meetings, and student community meetings.
- Respectful Relationships Program.
- Seeking feedback on policies and procedures from the school community.
- Staff, contractor and volunteer Child Safety training.



We concluded our day with a prayer in the Nano Nagle Chapel on the Presentation Campus, where many of our parents/guardians came to join us, and then for some afternoon tea. Sam gave us a very engaging and thought-provoking presentation about his journey, which ended with us having a day to remember for years to come.

We also have started the college's weekly Breakfast Club. These are held every Friday morning from 8-8:25am outside the Rahilly Centre on Presentation Campus and are supported by our Student College Leaders (House Captains, Campus Captains, and Prefects). A serving of food and a cup of juice are sold from \$1 (choices include pancakes, toast, toasties, crumpets, etc), and cash or card is now accepted. We've seen so many students across all year levels come to Breakfast Club, and we thank all those who have stopped by so far. We hope to see more students join us on Friday mornings! A huge thank you is owed to Ms Sandie Saundry, who prepares all the food and equipment provided for Breakfast Club. This wouldn't be running without her help and dedication.

# VTAC and SEAS

#### PREPARING FOR THE END OF YEAR 12

It does seem to be strange to be talking about the end of a year that has only just started, but it is important for students to have an eye on what they will be doing next and for families to have some knowledge about how to support them to get there.

One of the biggest events for Year 12s will be VTAC Applications. I encourage all students - VCE and VCE Vocational Major - to register and apply with VTAC for a course for 2024. This keeps many possibilities open for them until the end of the year, by which stage they will have a better idea of their real pathway and can make an informed decision. It is easy to change your mind if you are in the system, but harder to get in once it has closed!

VTAC will open for applications on Monday 31 July this year, and close on Thursday 28 September. During this time, students can apply for courses at VE (TAFE) Institutes and Universities, apply for scholarships and special consideration (SEAS – Special Entry Access Scheme).

I will be speaking to students about these matters at Community Meetings and assisting them with their registration and Preferences. I will also explain much more about SEAS and how it works as we draw closer to the time.

However, it is important that students take ownership of their SEAS application early in the year. For example, if a student has an illness or injury, they might miss some school but also struggle a little to get back on track with their studies. All this should be documented and the medical practitioner involved needs to be asked about providing a supporting statement, even if it cannot be done for some months.

This can help students maintain good records, not just of dates but also of how the student was impacted by the condition, so that they can write an impact statement as part of their SEAS application. If there have been any difficult circumstances, it is also important for the student to share this with a support person (not a family member) who can later write a supporting statement for them. **This cannot be done at the last minute!** 

With the ATAR playing a lesser role in some university applications, students need to consider applying for some of the many Early Entry Schemes, as well as the tests, folios and auditions that might occur after the exams. Students should be aware that these interviews and auditions often occur around the time of "schoolies" weeks, and might need to book locally or at a different time. Also, keeping good records of their own contributions to the school and outside community will make such applications a breeze! Making an early start on such applications can really relieve the stress later in the year!

You will be able to read about all these opportunities in the fortnightly Careers newsletter *Directions*, which is emailed directly to Year 9-12 parents and students. In addition, I will also email the new VTAC Factsheets as they are ready. You can also find out most of the information you need on ATARs and applications on the VTAC website <a href="www.vtac.edu.au">www.vtac.edu.au</a> and the most recent videos on the VTAC Media YouTube page.

### Year 7 Curriculum Music

It has been a very exciting Term 1 so far for Year 7 Music. In Term 2, the student groups come together to make a larger ensemble and work on musicianship, teamwork, listening, balance, rhythm and working independently while being part of a larger music ensemble.

Second-hand textbooks are needed for sale, especially at this time of the year, so please consider advertising yours for sale as other families will be most appreciative. The textbook stocktake is updated once every 24 hours to include all newly listed items for sale.

To sell books/items: Log-in to the Sustainable School Shop website, click Sell Books, then follow the prompts - where price and condition guidance is also provided. Please also remember to delist your advertised items as these are sold.

To <u>buy</u> books/items: Log in to the Sustainable School Shop website, click **Find Books**, then click on the items you need to get the contact details of the seller. Buyers make direct contact with sellers.


Please also note that the College P&F have previously paid a bulk subscription membership fee on behalf of our families when they registered to trade on the site. This year it was decided to utilise these funds elsewhere for our student needs. This decision will be reviewed again by P&F towards the end of next year. Options for trading on the Sustainable School Shop are:

- If you have items you wish to buy, you can register and manually search all the 'for sale' ads from the main search page and gain sellers contact details for free.
- If you have 3-5 items you wish to <u>sell</u> you can purchase 3-5 single ads at \$1.50 each.
- If you have 3-5 items to buy & have 3-5 items to sell you can purchase an annual subscription at \$21.95. NB: The Sustainable School Shop advises that experience has shown families usually find more items to advertise, so most decide to upgrade to an annual subscription.

Our P&F have also decided to support the Les Twentyman Foundation Back to School Program, which recycles and redistributes educational resources to students who would otherwise be unable to afford them. They currently require:

- Year 7-12 textbooks and study guides published since 2021,
- English novels and literature tests (i.e. novels / plays / poetry / DVD's)
- Atlases, dictionaries (English and foreign language), and thesauruses
- Calculators
- Laptops
- Stationary (either physical donations in new condition, or via the purchasing of vouchers from companies like Officeworks)

These items can be dropped off prior to the end of the school year at either of our campus Receptions, otherwise directly to the Les Twentyman Foundation drop off point at (the Bunbury Street gate at the rear of) 56 Whitehall Street, Footscray, Mondays-Thursdays, 0491 218 082. # **Record Broken**

### FINN DAVIS Stars at ACC Athletics 2023

On Thursday 23rd February at Lakeside Stadium Finn Davis reached for the stars with a massive leap of 1.87m in the under 16 high jump. The Division 1 competition with 7 schools and the Division 2 competition with 6 schools were on at the same time, side by side at the far end of the main arena.

When the bar reached 1.80m only two Division 1 and two Division 2 athletes remained. Finn cleared this on his first attempt and his opponent failed all 3 attempts giving Finn the blue ribbon for Division 2.

Meanwhile in the Division 1 competition, one boy cleared 1.80m and moved the bar to 1.83m. He cleared that and failed at 1.85m.



Finn on the other hand passed at 1.83m and requested the bar be raised to 1.85m to try to equal the school record. 1.85 m had been achieved on three previous occasions, by Roy Hughson in 1996, Chris Sylvio in 2002 and James Shirley in 2004. Finn cleared the bar on his second attempt and asked for the bar to be set at 1.87m. After two close but failed attempts he mustered every bit of remaining energy and finally succeeded in propelling himself over the bar with about a centimetre to spare.

With that leap he wrote his name into the record books, eliminating three names in the process and achieving the right to boast winning a Division 1 event. For a school with a 145-year history, records are extremely hard to come by and I imagine that this record by Finn Davis will last for many years to come.
