Teamwork

Over the past two weeks, I have had the good fortune to be involved with the ACC Public Speaking & Debating and CGSV Girls' Basketball Teams. I'll commence by complementing all participants on the high quality way in which they conducted themselves in these events. There was a real sense of joy in these days. There was unerring focus, too, and a genuine sense of cohesion. In the public speaking realm, it was positive to hear students encouraging each other, communicating clearly and fairly throughout. It was noteworthy how everyone found their individual role quickly and then played this role to the best of their ability. In debating, there was an initiator, someone driving the vision the team would promulgate. Others chipped in with key ideas – organising information, rendering it relatable, and interesting, to the judges. Others then worked on persuasive devices – gathering evidence, creating rhetorical questions, dragging in expert opinions, using emotive language to engender emotional response. It proved, once again, the power of focused collectivism and the great privilege it is to be part of team that is such in both name and in deed.

The basketball team were similarly synchronous. Two members brought the ball up the floor; two sat on the wings; two were cutters through the key and two were planted in the painted area and rebounded with much rigour (I know this is eight players – and that basketball as five on a court – but these were the roles for the squad). However, given the clarity of role and commitment to it, it *was like* having eight players on the court. The team were better than the sum of their considerable parts, as all good teams are.

School, in a way, is one big team. When we get enough of its members buying into the team, great things always occur.

As exam season opens, the winter sets in, let's look forward to seeing all members of our community playing their role, giving great effort and enjoying their days.

Exams

Year 10 and Unit 1 Exam are scheduled for this term. With Year 10 exams running from Wednesday, 24 – 26 May and Unit 1 from 7 – 14 June.

The exam booklets have all the information regarding these exams. The Year 10 booklet was emailed to students last week and the Unit 1 booklet will be emailed to students next week. Please take time to read through these booklets to familiarise yourself with the exam processes and rules.

Exams are the last opportunity for students to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding. We suggest that the students take the opportunity to develop good strategies and routines that will assist them to prepare for these exams.

When students have prepared well, they will feel confident and relaxed in the exam and position themselves to perform at their highest level. We are committed to supporting our students through this period and if they are feeling overly anxious and overwhelmed can seek assistance from their Pastoral Care Leader, Pastoral Care teacher, or the College Counsellor.

Students who are eligible for learning support are encouraged to apply for special provision. Ms Chris Sodaitis will send the application forms to eligible students. She can be contacted via email, csodaitis@stmaryscollege.vic.gov.edu if you have any questions.

Students will need to be at the College 15 minutes before their first exam of the day and remain on the grounds until their last exam. The College library will be available for quiet study between exam sessions.

The students are required to wear their winter uniform for all exams. We will be focusing on the following guidelines in the exam room:

- · Bring all equipment
- Line up before exams
- Technology to be left in lockers or handed up before the exam
- Watches to be removed and put on desk
- A clear drink bottle with water to be placed under the desk

Should a student be ill on the day of their exam, please phone the reception as early as possible and provide a medical certificate to the Pastoral Care Leader on return to school. The results for all exams will be available in the Learning Areas tab on PAM. 
Subject Changes for Semester 2


